

Noise is a Public Health & Quality of Life Issue


- Helicopters are a major source of noise pollution, the number-two public health threat after air pollution, according to the WHO.
- Noise pollution contributes to:
 - Stress
 - Hearing impairment
 - Sleep disruption
 - Metabolic disturbances
 - Exacerbated anxiety and depression
 - Worse academic performance in children
 - Unsafe environments for the hard of hearing

Noise pollution also activates our fight or flight response, which increases our blood pressure, slows our digestion, and inflames the lining of our blood vessels. Prolonged exposure can lead to cardiovascular diseases, obesity, and diabetes.



Our Cities are Less Safe

- Helicopters are not safe for passengers, crew members, or people on the ground.
- There is a long history of local helicopter crashes resulting in fatalities or injuries from 1970 to now.
- Sightseeing helicopter tours create a risk to our historic landmarks.




Environmental Pollutants

- Helicopters are also a source of particulate matter and in some cases even lead emissions.
- In fact, aircraft with piston engines are the largest source of lead emissions in the U.S. Leaded gasoline is still found in 170,000 piston-engine helicopters and planes.
- Particulate matter is linked to negative health impacts, including cancer.
- Fewer helicopters means fewer emissions and less noise pollution. The pandemic has shown that a reduction in aircraft pollution is beneficial for cardiovascular health.

Bad for The Economy

- Helicopter crashes disrupt businesses and utilize expensive emergency services.
- Noise pollution reduces real estate values and negatively impacts outdoor businesses, festivals and public events.
- Helicopter companies unfairly externalize their costs to society (eg. environmental, medical and emergency services).

Legislation and Introduced Bills

Federal Helicopter Safety Act 2025 H.R. 3196

H.R. 3196 – May 5, 2025- *The Improving Helicopter Safety Act of 2025* to amend title 49, United States Code, to prohibit helicopter flights within a 20 mile radius of the Statue of Liberty National Monument, and for other purposes.

Sponsors: Rep. Nadler (D-NY), Rep. Malliotakis (R-NY), Rep. Menendez (D-NJ) and cosponsors Rep. Meng (D-NY), Rep. Velasquez (D-NY), Rep. Goldman (D-NY), and Rep. McIver (D-NJ).

Federal Helicopter Safety and Noise Management Act H.R. 7769

H.R. 7769- 5/16/2022- Helicopter Safety and Noise Management Act if passed, would create a commission made up of the Administrator of the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA), members of local and state governments, and helicopter noise and safety advocates and develop a helicopter usage management plan to substantially reduce the number of nonessential rotorcraft operating at any given time

Sponsors: Carolyn B. Maloney (D-NY-12) and 23 others

Federal Communities Before Tourism Act H.R. 2613

H.R. 2613- 4/14/2023- Communities Before Tourism Act if passed, would require that voluntary agreements with respect to commercial air tour operations over national parks should consider the well-being of communities that aircraft fly over and require the FAA and National Park Service (NPS) to consult with these communities.

Sponsors: Rep. Rob Menendez (D-NJ-8), Frank Pallone Jr (D-NJ-6), Bill Pascrell Jr (D-NJ-9)

The Helicopter Oversight Act Passed April 2025 by NYC City Council (Int. 26-A, Law no. 2025/064)

In 2029, the law will ban helicopters that fail to meet the industry's strictest noise standards from using the two City-run heliports, East 34th Street and Downtown Manhattan / Downtown Skyport.

At the same time that it passed the bill, the Council approved *three strong resolutions*, Res. 233-A, Res. 85-A and Res. 226-A, which, respectively:

- Call on the FAA to ban all nonessential helicopters over New York City;
- 2. Urge the NYS legislature to pass and the Governor to sign bills **establishing noise taxes** for nonessential helicopter flights; and
- 3. Would **prohibit certain nonessential helicopters at municipal heliports**, including the W. 30th St Heliport located in the Hudson River Park, which is jointly controlled by the City and the State.

Establish a tax on noise from nonessential helicopter & seaplane flights

On June 5, 2025 Manhattan CB7 passed a resolution calling for a ban on nonessential helicopters
