



WHO ARE WCS YOUTH?



 **944** employees
 **472** interns
 **488** volunteers

54% of youth identified as Black or Hispanic, reflecting NYC demographics

319 youth moved into new roles at WCS between April 2024 and March 2025

including advancing into elevated positions and exploring different opportunities. We call this "latticing in action."

 **\$5.5M** earned in stipends and wages

 **32%** of youth were first generation college students

 **90%** live in New York City's five boroughs



WCS volunteers and interns represent 317 schools, including 153 NYC public high schools

SCI Network NYC internships prepare youth for careers at cultural institutions, in science research, and across industries.

Career Plans

75%

of youth would like to pursue a career in STEM

77%

of youth would like to work for a cultural institution in the future

Learning & Skill Development

In an open-ended question about learning:

53%

of youth described how they developed **workplace skills** like teamwork, time management, and communication.

55%

of youth described learning **position-specific skills** like machine learning, science research, pedagogy, plant identification, customer service, and animal husbandry.
