Dear Shawn Campbell,

We write to inform you that the City of New York plans to reduce speed limits in select areas throughout your district. Following the enactment of Sammy's Law, New York City Department of Transportation (NYC DOT) has the authority to reduce speed limits to 20 miles per hour on individual streets, 15 miles per hour next to schools, and to 10 miles per hour on streets with additional traffic calming measures.

Reducing traffic speeds is a safety measure that both reduces the incidence of crashes and reduces the chances of a fatality when a crash happens. Reduced speed limits are one of many tools that NYC DOT uses to achieve the goals of Vision Zero, a city initiative to eliminate all traffic deaths and serious injuries through data-driven engineering, enforcement and education. The speed limit will be reduced to 15 miles per hour at every eligible school location across the five boroughs in effort to protect children and their families on city streets.

The following areas in your district have been approved for a reduction in speed limits:

- **Ave I, between Ocean Ave and E 21 St** (Masores Bais Yaakov High School; Masores Bais Yaakov Elementary School)
- **Ave K, between E 29 St and Nostrand Ave** (I.S. 381; J.H.S. 240 Andries Hudde)
- **Ave L, between E 24 St and E 27 St** (P.S. 193 Gil Hodges)
- **E 23 St, between Campus Rd and Glenwood Rd** (P.S. 315; School of Science & Technology)
- **Glenwood Rd, between E 23 St and E 26 St** (Midwood High School; P.S. 315; School of Science & Technology)
- **Newkirk Ave, between Coney Island Ave and Argyle Rd** (P.S. 217 Colonel David Marcus School)
- **Westminster Rd, between Newkirk Ave and Glenwood Rd** (P.S. 217 Colonel David Marcus School)

From the date of this notification, your office will have 60 days to offer any comments to NYC DOT for the proposed location. Location or program feedback can be directed to my office directly by calling 646-892-1350.
